# Message from the Detachment Commander



I am pleased to present the Perth County Detachment - 2025 Detachment Board Annual Report. This report includes crime, traffic enforcement and community well-being data, and highlights initiatives and successes from the past year. 2025 was the last year of the 2023-2025 Perth County Detachment Action Plan and this report will provide a final update and progress results from that plan.

I am proud of the work undertaken by our detachment.

In 2025, the members of the Perth County OPP Detachment have demonstrated professionalism, resilience, and a commitment to community safety. Our work has focused on evidence-based enforcement, victim-centered investigations, and strengthening the trust placed in us by the communities we serve. I am pleased to provide this overview of key accomplishments and priorities.

Traffic enforcement remains a core pillar and priority. Officers conducted targeted enforcement on our roadways, focusing on impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving and commercial motor vehicle (CMV) safety. This proactive approach to traffic enforcement resulted in an increase in impaired driving and distracted driving charges.

Investigative excellence, compassion and empathy is our approach to criminal investigations and supporting victims of intimate partner violence (IPV). We maintained a victim-focused approach, ensuring a timely response, thorough investigations and collaboration with support agencies.

As we transition into 2026, drug trafficking and property crimes investigations are a priority. Intelligence – led investigations will be utilized to dismantle drug trafficking networks that fuel addiction and related crime. Through proactive patrols, and targeted investigations, officers were able to reduce property crimes.

The success of the Perth County OPP Detachment is rooted in the professionalism and preparedness of our members. Over the past year we invested in leadership development, enhanced mental health training, and IPV workshops.

Strong community partnerships remain essential to effective policing in Perth County. We continued to collaborate with municipalities, social service agencies, schools, health care partners, and community organizations to address root causes of crime and support vulnerable individuals. These relationships have strengthened our ability to respond to complex social issues with the appropriate resources, awareness, and partnerships.

Transparency and accountability are central to our service delivery. Regular engagement with the Perth County OPP Detachment Board has ensured open communication, shared priorities, and clear alignment with community expectations. The board's guidance and oversight continue to enhance public trust, integrity and accountability. This year marked continued progress in the deployment of body-worn-cameras. These devices support accurate evidence collection, enhanced officer accountability and

strengthen public confidence. Feedback from both officers and community members has been positive, and we remain committed to ensuring their effective use.

In 2026, we will release our new 2026-2029 Perth County Detachment Action Plan. This is the first action plan developed under the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*. We are working closely with our Perth County OPP Detachment Board and engaging with community members to ensure the needs of our communities are reflected in the commitments we make for the next four years.

Development of the 2026-2029 Perth County Detachment Action Plan will coincide with the creation of the 2026-2029 OPP Strategic Plan creating organizational alignment.

As we look ahead to emerging challenges and new opportunities in policing and community safety, our detachment members remain committed to our mission to serve our communities, protect our citizens, uphold the law, and preserve public safety.

<p>Enhance monitoring of court orders in relation to conditions of release of persons within the community.</p>	<p>The Perth County OPP Detachment made significant progress in 2025 in enhancing the monitoring of court ordered release conditions. Through technology, the bail compliance dashboard, targeted enforcement, offender management through bail compliance checks and strong partnerships with stakeholders, the detachment strengthened community safety.</p> <p>Continued focus in this area will remain a priority and the Perth County OPP will be implementing the Offender Management Apprehension Program (OMAP) in 2026.</p>
<p>To address and prevent illicit drug crime.</p>	<p>The detachment continued to prioritize drug related crime as a core public safety concern. The focus remained on disrupting drug trafficking networks, reducing drug related violence and preventing harm associated with drug use. The Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) led investigations targeting drug traffickers while sharing intelligence with neighbouring OPP Detachments and municipal police services.</p> <p>Harm reduction partnerships, youth engagement and public education all form prevention strategies, community awareness, and strong partnerships.</p> <p>Drug trafficking will remain a priority in 2026, with an overall goal of public safety and reducing the number of drugs that are available in the community.</p>
<p>Support victims of crime through community agencies and ensure investigations are victim-centred and trauma informed.</p>	<p>In 2025, the detachment remained committed to a victim-centered approach by strengthening partnerships with community agencies, and hosting training sessions and community workshops.</p> <p>Expanding the use of the Domestic Abuse Issues Investigator (DAII) has ensured investigative excellence, consistency in the approach to these investigations, as well as a mechanism to identify victim safety. The DAII program has become a shared framework between the OPP and community partners, allowing for coordinated safety planning, and more seamless transitions from a police response to ongoing support for the victim.</p>

	<p>Intimate partner violence (IPV) investigations and victim support is a priority for the Perth County OPP Detachment along with public awareness, and cooperation with community partners. Victim Services continues to see an increase in being offered by police and accepted by victims, reinforcing a victim-centred approach and strengthening overall service delivery.</p>
<p>Address and prevent property crime within our communities.</p>	<p>During this reporting period, the detachment seen a positive increase in clearance rates for property crimes, and an overall reduction in property crimes.</p> <p>The Auto Theft Prevention Unit was a major contributor to the significant reduction in stolen vehicles, through enforcement, engagement and public education.</p> <p>The detachment increased directed patrols in property crime hotspots such as commercial areas, and rural areas during crop planting and harvesting times. Targeted enforcement, intelligence sharing and collaboration with community partners played a key role in reducing property crimes.</p> <p>The detachment partnered with local municipalities, and community groups to deliver public awareness campaigns on theft prevention. Messaging emphasized locking vehicles, removing valuables, and reporting suspicious activity.</p> <p>The detachment will continue to build on these gains to maintain public safety and reduce victimization across Perth County.</p>

## 2025 Roadways, Waterways and Trails Progress Results

<p>To sustain a continuous and year-round focus on the causal factors of the motorized vehicle collisions.</p>	<p>Over the past year, our members have maintained a consistent focus on the primary causal factors contributing to serious and fatal collisions: impaired driving, aggressive driving, distracted driving, and lack of seatbelt use. These “Big Four” behaviours continue to represent the greatest threats to road safety within our communities, and our focus remains proactive enforcement.</p> <p>Perth County recorded 6 fatal injury collisions and 118 non-fatal injury collisions, a rise in overall collision severity. Key causal factors included 36 alcohol-related collisions, 186 speed-related collisions, and 106 inattentive-related collisions, with speed emerging as the most significant contributor.</p> <p>Several strategies have been implemented for 2026 to focus on these contributors such as local traffic initiatives, increased RIDE programs, provincial traffic initiatives and public education through media releases.</p>
<p>Focus on impaired driving through education and enforcement.</p>	<p>Impaired driving remains one of the most preventable yet persistent threats to highway safety in Perth County with a total of 36 alcohol-related collisions. Throughout the reporting period, our detachment maintained a consistent focus on reducing impaired-related collisions through a balanced approach of targeted enforcement and community education.</p> <p>Officers conducted strategic RIDE initiatives, high visibility patrols, and data driven enforcement in areas identified as high risk for impaired driving. These efforts were supported by ongoing training to ensure members remain equipped to detect impairment by alcohol, drugs, or a combination of both.</p> <p>Education remains a critical component of our approach. We worked closely with community partners, including MADD Canada, to increase awareness and prevention messaging. Local media and public display boards were used to reach residents across the county with timely and impactful information.</p> <p>We placed a strong emphasis on youth engagement, delivering presentations at local schools to encourage early understanding of the dangers and long-term consequences of impaired driving.</p>

<p>Enhance OPP visibility on roadways and trails.</p>	<p>In 2025, Perth County OPP had an increase in total frontline hours, which enhanced our visibility on our roadways, trails and in our communities. Our patrol percentage in 2025 was recorded at 23.8% which is higher than the provincial standard.</p> <p>Along with targeted traffic enforcement, officers conducted regular snowmobile and ATV patrols to address trespassing, mischief, and unsafe operation of off-road vehicles.</p> <p>Perth County OPP officers are committed to community and traffic safety through a high visibility and increased presence on our trails, roadways and in our communities.</p>

<p>Increased engagement of youth and seniors within the community to decrease victimization.</p>	<p>This reporting period saw a significant increase in community engagement initiatives focused on reducing victimization among youth and seniors across Perth County. Through targeted education, cooperation, and proactive outreach, the detachment strengthened relationships with vulnerable populations while promoting safety, awareness, and trust in policing. Recognizing the continued rise in fraud targeting older adults, members delivered multiple fraud and online scam prevention presentations across the county.</p> <p>Over the last year, Perth County OPP committed to youth engagement and leadership development through our OPP Youth Camp, Youth Police Academy, Kids Program, and the Youth in Policing Initiative. Through a broad range of youth initiatives, the detachment made measurable progress in increasing awareness and strengthening community relationships. These programs demonstrated the ongoing commitment of Perth County OPP to proactive policing, education, and collaborative community safety.</p>
<p>Partner with diversity and inclusion stakeholders in the community.</p>	<p>Our detachment continues to strengthen relationships with community partners whose mandates align with our commitment to safety, inclusion, and overall, well-being. These partnerships ensure that our policing approach remains community informed and responsive to the diverse needs of the people we serve.</p> <p>Organizations such as Optimism Place, the Children’s Aid Society, the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA), the Huron Perth Healthcare Alliance, and the Stop Violence Against Women Committee play pivotal roles in supporting diversity and inclusion. Together, they help build an important bridge between police and community, ensuring that individuals and families receive the support, advocacy, and resources they need.</p>
<p>Enhance communications between the OPP and the members of our community.</p>	<p>The detachment continued to strengthen communication and community trust through a wide range of engagement initiatives this year. IPV sessions increased public awareness of risk factors and reporting options, while the Coffee with a Cop series created informal opportunities for residents to speak directly with officers. The Book Club encouraged dialogue on leadership, and community issues, and</p>

	<p>participation in the Law Enforcement Torch Run and Cops for Cancer highlighted our ongoing commitment to local causes.</p> <p>Auxiliary Unit food drives supported families in need across the region, and both the Human Trafficking Workshop and Mental Health Awareness Workshop helped build community understanding of complex safety and wellness concerns. These initiatives enhanced visibility, and trust between the OPP and the communities we serve.</p>
<p>Recognize the work and support of members of the OPP and our community partners formally and informally.</p>	<p>This year, Perth County OPP prioritized recognizing the outstanding work of its members and the support of community partners. The detachment formally and informally acknowledged the professionalism and dedication of officers, civilian staff, and Auxiliary members throughout the year.</p> <p>A notable highlight was the recognition of a member of the public with a Life Saving Award for their decisive actions that directly contributed to saving a life, demonstrating the courage found within our community.</p> <p>Perth County OPP also issued positive media releases to highlight exceptional work, successful investigations, and meaningful community engagement, ensuring residents remain informed about the commitment and achievements of their local officers. Community partners continued to play an essential role in shared success, and their ongoing cooperation remains a key part of strengthening public safety across the county.</p>
<p>To develop police-hospital transitions with relevant healthcare facilities.</p>	<p>Throughout the reporting year, the detachment strengthened partnerships with local healthcare facilities to improve police-hospital transitions and continuity of care. Enhanced communication and coordinated handover processes supported patient centred care, reduced emergency department wait times and allowed officers to return to frontline duties more efficiently. These efforts promoted patience, professionalism, and smoother transitions of care for individuals requiring medical attention, reinforcing our shared commitment to community wellbeing.</p> <p>The continued cooperation with the Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) further supported smoother transitions of care, particularly for individuals experiencing mental health related crises. MCRT involvement improved shared decision</p>

	<p>making, reduced hospital pressures, and enhanced outcomes through timely, coordinated responses.</p>
<p>To identify co-response solutions for non-police related demands for service that impact police resourcing.</p>	<p>During the reporting year, the detachment focused on identifying solutions for non-police related demands for service that continued to impact police resourcing. Through sustained engagement with community and justice partners, alternative pathways were implemented to better address non-criminal matters while preserving police capacity for core public safety responsibilities.</p> <p>A key advancement was the creation of the HSJCC Adult Mediation Program, providing an effective diversion option for non-criminal code issues and reducing unnecessary police involvement. In addition, the continued use of the MCRT strengthened responses to mental health related calls, improving outcomes for individuals while easing demands on detachment resources.</p>

## Other Community Updates

In 2025, the detachment maintained a strong focus on proactive crime prevention and high-visibility community patrols to support public safety and community confidence. Community engagement efforts in Perth County continued to exceed the provincial standard, highlighting a policing approach that is responsive, approachable, and community centred.

Officers remained committed to respectful, unbiased interactions with members of racialized groups, supported by ongoing awareness and professionalism. In interactions with persons who appear to have a mental illness, officers prioritized de-escalation, patience, and the use of appropriate responses to support safe, respectful outcomes.

# Policing Hours

The OPP has developed a Service Delivery Model (SDM) in response to several reviews and audit recommendations. The SDM is designed to:

- Promote officer wellness through balanced workloads
- Determine adequate staffing levels at each detachment
- Ensure the continued delivery of adequate and effective policing services in accordance with the *Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA)*

To support SDM implementation, the OPP is undertaking a multi-year staffing strategy to address required increases in detachment personnel. This model supports the OPP’s ability to:

- Respond effectively to increasing calls for service
- Maintain safe communities through proactive patrols and community engagement
- Meet municipal expectations for police visibility

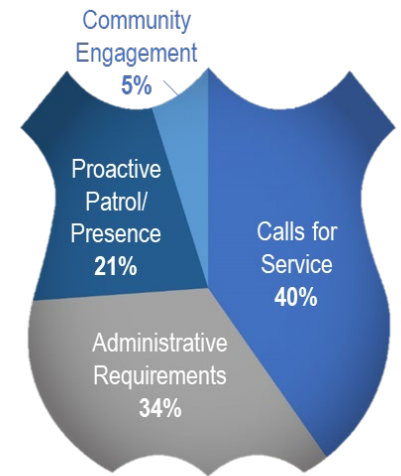


Figure 1: Service Delivery Model Provincial Target

To monitor progress and guide detachment-level planning, the OPP has established time allocation targets for provincial constables (Figure 1). These targets reflect how time should ideally be distributed by the end of the SDM staffing strategy.

The targets are based on a provincial average, and variations are expected between detachments due to differences in geography, operational structure, recruitment and leave of absence rates.

Detachments may face challenges in achieving these targets, but progress is expected as scheduling, data quality and strategic deployment continue to improve.
